Hi Michael

Many thanks for your e mail and your donation. Every bit helps as so many have lost their homes and businesses. Here is a quick update:

5,700 homes burned down in Sonoma and Napa at this point.

Many businesses in Santa Rosa destroyed completely

41 people have died in the fires

22 people in our company lost their homes in the fire

Some wineries were lost or affected.

Jackson Family Wines did not lose any wineries or vineyards

All of our chardonnay and pinot was already in by the time of the fires

90% of our Bordeaux varietals were in before the fires

Looks like the rest of the Bordeaux blends were barely impacted

The city of Santa Rosa took a massive hit, and so many homes have been destroyed, along with businesses ranging from restaurants to tire stores. It will take years to rebuild, and we are unfortunately a long way from even starting that process. Leslie and I were evacuated the very first evening as the fire came to our house quickly from where it started. The winds were very strong that night. The fire got to within 300 feet of our house, and the wind changed and the fire went around us over the next few days, so we still have a house to go back to. We just got access yesterday and will begin the clean up process to get rid of the smoke damage to the house, but we are one of the lucky ones. 170 homes burned down next to us.

Jackson Family Wines is back up and running, and as you say, we get knocked down but then get back up. I hope many people around the world will continue to support the California wine industry as many will need that support.

Massive California Wine-Country Fires Worsen, Sending More Residents Fleeing

Calistoga and Geyserville are evacuated as flames spread and dangerous winds are forecast; now at least 23 dead and seven wineries destroyed

Residents of Northern California wine country were wondering if they would lose everything Wednesday as several large wildfires continued to spread throughout Napa, Sonoma and Mendocino Counties, advancing on new towns, including Calistoga and Geyserville, which are under mandatory evacuation orders.

The death toll from the fires that started Oct. 8 and 9 has risen to 23, and more than 170,000 acres, up from 124,000 on Tuesday, had burned throughout the state since Sunday night, according to the California Department of Forestry and Fire Prevention (Cal Fire).

The biggest was the Atlas fire in the eastern hills of Napa County, which had topped 42,000 acres Wednesday morning and was listed as only 3 percent contained. Parts were spreading into neighboring Solano County, home to the Suisun Valley and Green Valley American Viticultural Areas. Sonoma had multiple blazes, while Mendocino's Redwood fire had grown to 30,000 acres.

Though a Tuesday respite from high winds that fanned the flames allowed firefighters to make progress, "we're not out of the woods yet," said Ken Pimlott, director of CalFire, in a midday Office of Emergency Services news conference in Sacramento attended by other state and federal emergency officials and California Gov. Jerry Brown. "And we're not going to be out of the woods for a great number of days to come."

"We are at very low containment on most of these," said Pimlott. "These fires are literally burning faster than firefighters can run."

Of the confirmed deaths, 13 occurred in Sonoma, six in Mendocino, two in Napa and two in Yuba County. Hundreds of people were missing, and 4,400 reported to be in evacuation shelters, according to the Office of Emergency Services.

A total of 3,500 homes and businesses were reported destroyed or damaged in the three northern counties. At least seven wineries have been significantly or totally damaged—five in Napa, including Signorello Estate and White Rock Vineyards; Sonoma's Paradise Ridge Vineyards and Mendocino's Frey Vineyards. Another 11 in Napa, including Stags' Leap Winery, have reported to the Napa Valley Vintners that they have some damage to the winery, other building or vineyards; Sonoma and Mendocino are still tallying damage reports.

The latest winery casualty to be confirmed in the Atlas fire is the small Patland Vineyards, founded by Henry and Olga Patland beginning with the 2007 vintage. They specialized in red wines made from their estate vineyard and nearby Stagecoach Vineyard.

Winemaker Jay Buoncristiani confirmed the news. "The Patlands' estate, perched at 1,500 feet above Soda Canyon Road, was wiped out by the fierce Atlas fire early on Sunday night," Buoncristiani told *Wine Spectator*. "I feel so badly for their loss. They are like family to me, but they are handling it amazingly well, and feel like I do: As long as lives are safe, the rest is replaceable, and things could have been far worse. In fact, Michael Patland saved his neighbor's life by waking him up and getting him out of his home, which was toasted within a short time after escaping."

As far as the Stagecoach Vineyard, no one can get close to assess the damage. Buoncristiani also can't get access to the Caves at Soda Canyon, where his wines are fermenting. "We have a lot in barrel already, but I also currently have at least seven fermentations that are running wild in the Caves, and I am so eager to get in there and check on their status and I'm prepared for the challenge to bring them home to dryness safely."

Resources are now flooding into the region from throughout California and neighboring states to battle the blazes, Pimlott says. Eight thousand firefighters are now on the lines, along with 550 fire engines and 73 helicopters and 30 air tankers dropping fire retardant. An additional 170 fire engines from out of state are on their way to the region

That's a marked improvement in tactical support from Tuesday, when billowing smoke clouds limited the ability of aircraft to fly safely. "Today is a very different picture," said Pimlott, who noted that aircraft were up and flying this morning in "an aggressive aerial assault." In addition, 700 soldiers of the California National Guard are helping battle the fires.

On the ground, shifting winds and the spreading scope of the fires were the major concern. The 28,000-acre Tubbs fire, which had started near the northern Napa Valley town of Calistoga and quickly spread to the city of Santa Rosa to destroy entire neighborhoods, is now burning on the slopes of Mt. St. Helena. Calistoga, which lies at the base of the mountain, was under evacuation as a result.

Flames from the Nuns fire that had devastated parts of Sonoma's Glen Ellen area were now spreading up the hillsides around on Mt. Veeder, on Napa Valley's western side. Around 4 p.m. Tuesday, Carole Meredith heard a knock on the door. "Police went to every house to get people out," said the cofounder of Lagier Meredith, who lives at the winery. "This is a harrowing experience. Wish I could just fast-forward a few days and know whether our place survived," Meredith said, adding that her grapes were all in and her wine is safe in a facility on the valley floor. "Our property is both our home and our business, so it's everything."

A new fire sprung up in Sonoma County east of Boyes Hot Springs earlier today, while two other smaller ones, one near Kenwood and one east of Rohnert Park, became major concerns.

Where the fires go next and how quickly crews can bring them under control is largely due to one key factor: wind. Calistoga is in danger if the winds shift, as they were forecast to do later Wednesday. Sunday night's firestorm was stoked by gusting and bone-dry northerly winds of almost 70 mph and, according to Pimlott, a "critically dry fuel bed," resulting from the previous five years of drought.

Since abating Monday morning, red-flag fire warnings were up once again for the region through Thursday afternoon as the northerly winds were expected to return, though they were not predicted to be as strong as on Sunday. The concern, said Pimlott, is that large fires on the eastern and western ridges of Napa County and to the north could merge into one giant fire.

Evacuations were also ordered for sections of the Sonoma County town of Geyserville, where the Pocket fire also grew in size Wednesday, and were extended in the Sonoma Valley and Bennett Valley regions south of Santa Rosa. Many roads were still closed in the region to allow fire crews access, including portions of the Silverado Trail and those in the Atlas Peak region of Calistoga, as well as Highway 12 in Sonoma Valley. That's making it hard for vintners and residents to find out whether their buildings are still standing.

Sonoma County Sheriff Rob Giordano says it could be a week or longer before residents are allowed back into evacuation areas. "Today's conditions are what we are waiting for now," Giordano said. "Evacuate to the south. If you can leave the county, even better."
